WHY FUNDRAISE FOR POPPYSCOTLAND?



Every penny you raise for Poppyscotland helps the Armed Forces community in Scotland.

Whether a veteran is struggling with a life-changing battlefield injury, psychological trauma, financial hardship, homelessness or has turned to substance misuse to cope, we are here to help.

BEHIND THEM ALWAYS

Poppyscotland is best known for running the iconic Scottish Poppy Appeal which, with your help, raises over £2 million each year.

This, combined with our year-round fundraising, enables us to provide tailored support and funding to thousands of ex-Service personnel as well as offer vital services in:

- advice
- employment
- mobility
- housing
- mental health support.

We believe no veteran should live without the prospect of employment, good health, and a home after serving their country.

Since 1921 we have helped countless men, women and families with issues linked to their time in the Armed Forces or with struggles adjusting from military life to 'Civvy Street'.

Whatever support they need, we are here.

BEHIND DONALD

Donald is a Falklands veteran who was homeless for six months following his time in the Army.

With Poppyscotland's help, Donald turned his life around and these days works in our Lady Haig's Poppy Factory in Edinburgh.



"When you're on the streets, you realise that so many of those you meet are ex-Services. Soldiers learn to act a certain way; to be totally self-sufficient. There is no-one when you come out to point you in the right direction. In the Army, your life is run for you, but it's not like that on Civvy Street, and that's why veterans like me should never hold back in asking for help."



HOW YOUR FUNDRAISING MAKES A DIFFERENCE

AS LITTLE AS £10 CAN CHANGE A LIFE

Here are some things your fundraising makes possible every day of the year:

£10 – Helps towards the cost of travel expenses for a veteran to attend a job interview.

£20 – Living rough can be a frightening and lonely life. As little as £20 can provide a homeless veteran with a night's accommodation.

£50 – The road to recovery can be long and challenging. £50 could provide a day trip for a veteran suffering with mental health challenges, allowing them a change of environment, which can play an important part in their recovery.

£153 – The cost of an Occupational Therapy Report to assess how a home environment can be improved and adapted for special needs.

£697 – The average home start-up grant awarded for necessities.

£1337 – This is the average amount given towards home mobility adaptations.

SKILLS FOR LIFE


Taking part in fundraising activities either virtually or locally can help young people develop skills for learning, life and work. They will gain hands-on knowledge and understanding of their local environment and community.

Fundraising also gives young people the chance to apply critical thinking skills, learn from others, work as part of a team or independently, set a goal, and experience a genuine sense of achievement.

DEVELOPING THE YOUNG WORKFORCE

Taking the initiative, thinking creatively, making decisions and assessing risk are all valuable skills that will help young people expand their wider achievements and prepare them for the world of work.

Fundraising offers young people the opportunity to apply different kinds of learning in new situations and could even shape their future career choices and volunteering pursuits.



25 INSPIRING IDEAS









1. SCHOOL SOCIAL MEDIA CHALLENGE

In the run up to the Scottish Poppy Appeal, why not get your whole school community involved in a special social media challenge?

- Ask your Head Teacher to post to your school's Twitter or Facebook encouraging pupils, parents and teachers to do something specific — the task can be fun, challenging, impressive, surprising or anything in between — and take a photo or video of them doing it.
- Ask everyone to post their challenges to their own social media, tagging the school and Poppyscotland, helping to spread the word and encourage others to sponsor them.

2. LIGHT UP RED

Get your school and other local businesses/community groups involved in our national #LightUpRed campaign poppyscotland.org.uk/fundraising-guide

Every year hundreds of buildings across Scotland Light Up Red to mark remembrance and show support for the Scottish Poppy Appeal.

Famous landmarks that regularly take part are Rosslyn Chapel, Eilean Donan Castle and the Kishorn Selfie Box in the Highlands.



3. HUGE POPPIES IN THE WINDOWS

Make huge poppies out of card and tissue paper and place them in the windows of your school. Or ask local businesses to sponsor a poppy you have made. You can create a dazzling display of poppies along your local high street while also raising money for Poppyscotland.

5. POPPY WALK

A sponsored walk is a quick and fun to way fundraise with friends and improve everyone's health and wellbeing.

Trek to an ancient battlefield, local war memorial or just walk the circuit of your school campus as part of your daily mile.

- Remembrance research project: Walk to your local war memorial and write down the names of the Service personnel on the plaque. Cover an A4 or A3 sheet of paper with stickon poppies, then ask your friends to guess how many poppies are in the poster.

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6. HOST A TEA & TOAST EVENT

Toast, tea bags, milk and mates are all you need for the perfect **Tea & Toast** event.

Did you know: Tea & Toast comes from a military tradition of having a cup of tea and slice of toast at break times when away on operations, providing a comforting reminder of home?

Poppyscotland's Regional Fundraising team can help you plan your Tea & Toast event and give you free materials like Poppy bunting, napkins, stick-on poppies and collecting tins.

8. POPPY RUN

Your registration fee includes a Poppy Run T-shirt and medal, and if you raise over £100, you'll receive a fantastic medallion.

9. POPPY DOG JOG

Get your four-legged friends and their owners jogging around your local park.

Tie red ribbons or red bandanas to your dog's collar or lead and make them stand out from the pack.



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10. POPPY BOUNCE

Put the fun into fundraising with a Poppy Bounce event!

You could use a trampoline, a bouncy ball, a pogo stick, or even a bouncy castle.

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11. POPPY QUIZ

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12. POPPY CYCLE

13. POP-UP WW1/WW2 MUSEUM

Research life on the home front during WW1 or WW2 and create your own classroom museum.

Dress up in costumes in tribute to the war generation or be a tour guide and show other year groups what you have learned about conflict.

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14. POPPY READATHON

Challenge your class to read as many books, poems and short stories as possible about conflict and refugees within 24 hours.

Borrow popular stories like War Horse, The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas and The Poppy Story Book from your school library.

Ask friends and family to sponsor your class per book or minute of reading.







15. POPPY BAKE SALE

Impress everyone with your baking skills and raise money with these delicious baking ideas - Poppy Cup Cake & Iced Poppy Biscuits Recipe Sheets poppyscotland.org.uk/tea-toast

Take baking inspiration from Pittenween Primary School and Leith Academy.

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16. POPPY FACE PAINTING

Face painting instantly adds fun to your poppy fundraising event. So set up your face paints, a comfy chair for your customers and get painting.











17. POPPY CAR WASH

A charity car wash is fun, simple to organise and a great way to raise money working as part of a team.

Together decide where your car wash could be held:

- School playground
- Community centre car park
- Supermarket car park (permission will be needed)
- Workplace car park (have your car washed while you work)
- In people's own driveways

Your choice of venue will help you plan how you to target passers-by. Next, assemble your buckets, sponges and soapy liquid.

Access to a water supply is also obviously a must-have.

19. POPPY FOOTBALL MATCH

Organise a charity football match just for fun or in remembrance of former pupils from your school who lost their lives during the First World War, Second World War or in modern conflicts.

Take inspiration from the Christmas truce football match of 1914 that was played between British and German troops on Christmas Day in the trenches during the First World War and hold your own sponsored Remembrance Day Football Match.

You could even design your own football strip like our 2019 Learning Competition Winners Archie and Ruaridh from Oban High School. Why not order some banners for your football match?

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20. POPPY PERFORMANCE (THEATRE/MUSIC/DANCE)

Organise a short play or performance event linked to conflict taking inspiration from literature, current events and/or veterans' stories.




21. POPPY ARTS AND CRAFTS SALE
